Low Income Subsidy for Medicare Prescription Drug Coverage

Low Income Subsidy Medicare Extra Help Program

The Low-Income Subsidy program may help with Medicare Part D costs like premiums, deductibles, copayments, and other prescription drug costs. For example, in 2019, those who get the Low-Income Subsidy won't pay more than \$3.40 for a covered generic prescription drug or \$8.50 for a covered brand-named medication.

What's the Medicare Low Income Subsidy for Part D?

If your income is below 135% of the FPL (\$17,226 if you are single or \$23,274 for married couples), you could qualify for the full Low Income Subsidy (resource limits also apply - see charts below) Qualifying for Partial-LIS Benefits:

2020 Federal Poverty Level Guidelines for Low Income Subsidy

If a person receiving the low-income subsidy enrolls in a Medicare Part D plan that has a premium higher than their state's benchmark premium, the beneficiary is responsible for paying the difference in premiums - unless the difference between the benchmark premium and the plan premium are relatively small (please see the explanation of the de minimis premium policy below*).

Extra Help is a federal program that helps pay for some to most of the out-of-pocket costs of Medicare prescription drug coverage. It is also known as the Part D Low-Income Subsidy (LIS). If your monthly income up to \$1,538 in 2018 (\$2,078 for couples) and your assets are below specified limits, you may be eligible for Extra Help.

Medicare Part D Low Income Subsidy

Low-Income Subsidy for Part D. Extra Help is a Medicare program to help people with limited income and resources pay Medicare prescription drug costs. You may qualify for Extra Help if your yearly income and resources are below these limits in 2019: Single person - yearly income less than \$18,375 and less than \$14,390 in other resources per year. Married person living with a spouse and no other dependents - yearly income less than \$25,365 and less than \$28,720 in other resources per year.

To help defray the cost of prescription drugs for beneficiaries with limited means, the Medicare Prescription, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003 included the low-income subsidy (LIS) in the Part D prescription drug insurance program. To qualify for the LIS, beneficiaries must be enrolled in a Part D plan and their assets and income must be less than the thresholds established by the law. This report focuses on beneficiaries' access to prescription drugs by examining: (1) the importance of assets and income in LIS denials in 2006 and 2007; and (2) state and manufacturer programs providing access to prescription drugs for Medicare beneficiaries. To help the elderly and disabled with prescription drug costs, the Congress passed the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement and Modernization Act of 2003 (MMA), which created a voluntary outpatient prescription drug benefit (Medicare Part D). A key element of the prescription drug benefit is the low-income subsidy, or extra help, available to Medicare beneficiaries with limited income and resources to assist them in paying their premiums and other out-of-pocket costs. To assess the Social Security Admin's. implementation of the subsidy, this report provides info. on: (1) the number of applicants approved for or denied the low-income subsidy; and (2) challenges of identifying individuals eligible for the subsidy and targeting outreach efforts.

The 2003 Medicare Prescription Drug Improvement and Modernization Act (Pub. L. No. 108-173) added a new prescription drug benefit to the Medicare program known as Part D (prescription drug coverage), as well as the Low-Income Subsidy (LIS) program to provide "extra help" with premiums, deductibles, and copayments for Medicare Part D beneficiaries with low income and limited assets. This analysis was designed to provide an independent estimate of the LIS-eligible population as of 2006, to examine the robustness of the estimate against alternative assumptions and estimation methods, to examine the characteristics of the LIS-eligible population, and to project the size of the LIS-eligible population to 2008. An estimated 12 million persons, or 29 percent of Medicare beneficiaries, were potentially eligible for the LIS in 2006 and most were eligible for the full subsidy. The eligibility rate is higher for the under-age-65 population and for those in nursing homes. There is considerable uncertainty around the estimated number of LIS eligibles, however, due to differences in the two main data sources employed, the Survey of Income and Program Participation and the Health and Retirement Study.

To help defray out-of-pocket prescription drug costs for limited or low-income Medicare beneficiaries, the Medicare Part D outpatient prescription drug program offers a low-income subsidy (LIS) for eligible beneficiaries. In 2010, about 9.4 million beneficiaries received the LIS -- about 40% of the approx. 23 million Medicare Part D beneficiaries in that year. Most of the LIS beneficiaries received the full LIS, thus paying no premiums or deductibles as long as they enrolled in so-called "benchmark" stand-alone prescription drug plans (PDP). Benchmark PDPs are those plans with premiums at or below a specified benchmark for a given geographic region, calculated by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), the agency within the Dept. of Health and Human Services (HHS) that administers the Medicare program. Full LIS beneficiaries may also enroll in other Part D plans but must pay any difference between the premium of the plan in which they choose to enroll and the benchmark for their region. Medicare Part D Low-Income Subsidy: Additional Efforts Would Help Social Security Improve Outreach and Measure Program Effects

The structure of the Medicare Part D prescription drug program generally encourages plan sponsors to submit low bids. However, rules in the program relating to low-income beneficiaries generate a different set of incentives for plans seeking to serve those beneficiaries. This report finds that over the first five years of the Part D program, two types of plans emerged -- those that catered primarily to beneficiaries receiving low-income subsidies (LIS plans) and those that catered primarily to standard beneficiaries (non-LIS plans). For each additional plan sponsor that entered the market, non-LIS basic plans reduced their bids by a statistically significant \$0.40 to \$0.70 (or .5%-.8%) per month of coverage, on average, while the bids of LIS plans did not repond in a statistically significant way. LIS plans were also more likely to increase their bids so that their premiums approached the maximum premium subsidy, called the low-income benchmark. Figures and tables.
